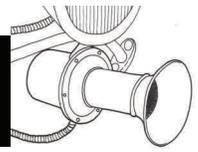

The Rebirth of a Model A

Michael Etling began the restoration of the car. To say he fixed the car is an understatement. The car was put through a complete tear down and rebuild just as Henry would like it done. The front end was completely rebuilt. The rear was cleaned and painted. The engine was removed and the timing gear replaced. The engine was also cleaned, painted the proper color as well as tuned up. The transmission was removed and a new clutch installed, painted as well as bearings and gaskets replaced. The braking system was completely rebuilt—new brakes, drums, and bearings. The radiator was sent out to be boiled-out and painted. New hoses, fan blades and clamps were installed. The complete electrical wiring harness was replaced and new LED tail lights installed. The speedometer was rebuilt. The wheels were sent out to be sand blasted and powder coated black. New tubes and tires were installed including the spare. New bumpers were installed front and back along with a new Spartan Klaxon. All bright work was cleaned and polished. The car was cleaned, polished and waxed—several times. And finally a new top and interior was installed. The car looked (and still does) look great. Please remember that months of work has just been boiled down into 1 long paragraph. Henry couldn't have done a better job.

Mike finally finished, and we are blown away by how beautiful the car is. He called, said he is driving it up RT 95. Wow, a Model A on 95North, hard to believe, but he did it. He met his Mom on Dungan Road and the 2 of them arrived, Mike in my Model A and his Mom following behind. Now my baby was home.

I told Mike I needed to drive it around the block, with him sitting next to me, since it's been 40 years, and I wasn't all that experienced back then. I drove, quite rusty, but at least I got the feel, and we returned home, & **He** put it back into my garage.

Model A Ford Museum construction underway, Grand Opening scheduled for May 2013

With a groundbreaking ceremony in April, construction is now under way for the Model A Ford Museum at the Gilmore Car Museum and on pace for a completion by Labor Day weekend, with activities already planned for this September and its Grand Opening scheduled for May 2013.

Announced in late 2010, the 12,000-square-foot museum is expected to be the largest public museum dedicated to Ford's Model A when finished and will take its place alongside several other specialty museums on the grounds of the Gilmore in Hickory Corners, Michigan, including the Classic Car Club of America Museum, the Pierce-Arrow Museum, the Franklin Collection at Hickory Corners, the Tucker Historical Collection and Library, the Cadillac-La Salle Foundation and the Lincoln Motorcar Foundation, as well as the Midwest Miniatures Museum.

"The museum will be more than just a car collection," said Art Callan, executive director of the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc., which is overseeing the construction of the museum. "It will take you on a journey through the Model A years – the end of the Roaring Twenties, the stock market crash in 1929, and the beginning of the Depression." In addition to the foundation's collection of cars and trucks, the museum will also house display engines, factory photos, blueprints, and research materials in a building patterned loosely after a design suggestion for a medium-sized Ford dealership in the May 1929 issue of *Ford Dealer and Service Field* magazine.



The foundation has also been primarily responsible for fundraising for the museum's \$1.6 million construction and operation budget. According to Stan Johnson, president of the foundation, funding has come almost entirely through private donations. "This has been a 20 year effort, but more than half of the construction funds were raised in 2011 – a \$50,000 challenge resulted in an influx of \$300,000 at the end of 2011," he said. "We have raised enough funding to accomplish the construction of the building, so we are striving now to encourage donations (funds and artifacts) for the outfitting and setup of the interior of the building."

According to Johnson, construction should be completed by Labor Day weekend, in plenty of time for the foundation's Model A Day at Gilmore on September 15. "By that time we will only have an empty building, but we already have several Model A Ford vehicles in storage at Gilmore, so we will have a few 'props' for our planned events," Johnson said. "Our tentative plans call for allowing visiting Model A drivers to enter the front vehicle door of the museum, drive into a prepared setup in the museum, have a high-quality photo taken of their car in the museum, allow them to drop off a donation of money or a museum quality artifact, and then drive out the rear vehicle door."

Among the vehicles already in the collection and slated to go on display at the museum are a 1928 Tudor, a 1930 school bus, a 1930 service car, and a 1929 business coupe.

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


