Winter Storage Tips

It's not that far away. Cold weather is coming and for some people that means sending their old iron into mothballs until the spring thaw. In order to make sure your car comes out of winter storage in the same condition in which it went in, there are some major items to take care of before closing the garage door.

Fuel: top off the tank and include fuel stabilizer, circulating it throughout the system by taking a short drive before putting the car in the garage for the winter.

Cooling: Drain the entire system and the radiator and refill with rust-deterrent antifreeze.

Oil: Change both the oil and the filter and choose a winter oil with corrosion protection.

Battery: Hook it up to a charger or a similar charge-maintaining device for the duration.

Tires: Deflate slightly to take stress off the suspension or, better still, elevate the vehicle on jack stands.

Paint: There's no substitute for that pre-winter bath, complete with a thorough drying and a nice coat of wax. Choose a car cover made of breathable cloth and stay away from plastic that traps moisture and encourages rust. (On any unpainted metal surface, a layer of rust inhibitor is a good idea.)

Vinyl, leather, rubber: In dry climates apply a preservative to the seats, dash, and other interior components to moisturize the material and ward off cracking.

Convertibles: Put the top up for the winter or you run the risk of shrinkage during extended periods of storage.

Finally, you're not setting up a winter hostel for varmints and insects. Your best defense is mothballs – and plenty of them – inside the car and under the dash. Don't forget to cover the tailpipe or you're just leaving the back door open.

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

MUST READ, EVEN IF YOU DON'T OWN A CAR

Safety Alert!

Here are some reasons why we don't allow cell phones in operating areas, propylene oxide handling and storage area, propane, gas and diesel refueling areas.

The Shell Oil Company recently issued warning after three incidents in which mobile phones (cell phones) ignited fumes during fuelling operations

In the first case, the phone was placed on the car's trunk lid during fuelling; it rang and the ensuing fire destroyed the car and the gasoline pump.

In the second, an individual suffered severe burns to their face when fumes ignited as they answered a call while refueling their car!

And in the third, an individual suffered burns to the thigh and groin as fumes ignited when the phone, which was in their pocket, rang while they were fuelling their car.

You should know that: Mobile Phones can ignite fuel or fumes

Mobile phones that light up when switched on or when they ring release enough energy to provide a spark for ignition

Mobile phones should not be used in filling stations, or when fuelling lawn mowers, boat, etc.

Mobile phones should not be used, or should be turned off, around other materials that generate flammable or explosive fumes or dust, (i.e., solvents, chemicals, gases, grain dust, etc...)

TO sum it up, here are the Four Rules for Safe Refueling:

- 1) Turn off engine
- 2) Don't smoke
- 3) Don't use your cell phone – leave it inside the vehicle or turn it off
- 4) Don't re-enter your vehicle during fuelling.

Bob Renkes of Petroleum Equipment Institute is working on a campaign to try and make people aware of fires as a result of 'static electricity' at gas pumps. His company has researched 150 cases of these fires. His results were very surprising:

- 1) Out of 150 cases, almost all of them were women.

- 2) Almost all cases involved the person getting back in their vehicle while the nozzle was still pumping gas. When finished, they went back to pull the nozzle out and the fire started, as a result of static.
- 3) Most had on rubber-soled shoes.
- 4) *Most men never get back in their vehicle until completely finished. This is why they are seldom involved in these types of fires.*
- 5) Don't ever use cell phones when pumping gas
- 6) It is the vapors that come out of the gas that cause the fire, when connected with static charges.
- 7) There were 29 fires where the vehicle was re-entered and the nozzle was touched during refueling from a variety of makes and models. Some resulted in extensive damage to the vehicle, to the station, and to the customer.
- 8) Seventeen fires occurred before, during or immediately after the gas cap was removed and before fuelling began.

NEVER get back into your vehicle while filling it with gas. If you absolutely HAVE to get in your vehicle while the gas is pumping, make sure you get out, close the door **TOUCHING THE METAL**, before you ever pull the nozzle out. This way the static from your body will be discharged before you ever remove the nozzle.

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
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What Gasoline is Best for my Car?

Question: Is gas just gas? I have Shell, American, Mobile and Sunoco, and all the other stations such as BJ's, Coastal and so on. Shell states that its gas is nitrogen enriched. Mobile states that theirs has detergent and the list goes on and on with these so called additives. What's to believe? Is it a joke, marketing ploy or whatever? Which gasoline should I use?

Crude oil is obviously being sourced from the same place throughout the world and gasoline is produced from oil in essentially the same way throughout the world. And any minor differences in the raw gasoline stock are eliminated when the production from different refineries are mixed together in immense tanks at common distribution points.

By the time gasoline reaches the consumer however, there are some notable differences. These differences stem from the ways in which different grades of gasoline are blended and, more importantly, what additives are mixed with the gasoline to change its properties. Different brands do use different additive packages to some extent. The Federal Government mandates the inclusion, and the exclusion, of certain additives that relate to emissions, fuel economy, and irrational and unjust political machinations, but beyond these legal requirements the oil companies are free to formulate their additives as they wish. Of course, all of the companies are working within the same framework, namely the laws of physics, chemistry and so on, so from that perspective they are all trying to accomplish similar goals in different ways.

So, with all of this as background information, I can't tell you whether one specific brand is better than the rest.



I can, however, make some general recommendations about gasoline:

First, I do recommend buying major name brands instead of no-name or off-brands because you can be confident that major brands have a more complete additives package.

Second, when possible, buy from stations that sell a lot of gas because this helps ensure that their stock is fresh.

And, third and perhaps most importantly, listen to what your car tells you about the gasoline you are using. If the engine runs well and doesn't ping, and the spark plugs don't get fouled, then the gasoline you're buying is good.
