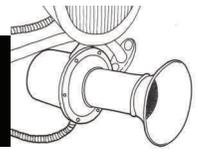


Handy Distributor Diagnostic Tool

James Taylor of Taylor Made Motors produced this handy tool. It helps with tune-ups.

To Make: Simply find an old but usable distributor cap top. Using a hacksaw or grinder, safely cut or grind off the sides of the cap, leaving about $\frac{3}{4}$ to 1" in the center. I found the hacksaw method slow and the grinding wheel relatively fast, but dusty. Be sure to wear safety glasses and a dust mask. Leave the spring clip retainers on it so you are able to secure it to the distributor when using.

To Use: Simply replace your distributor cap top with this one and observe the operation of the interior of the distributor when the car is running. This device will clearly show spark between the rotor and each cylinder spark wire as well as mechanical issues that may occur inside the distributor such as a wobbly or misaligned rotor.

Note: be sure to replace the cap with the original to help keep water and other contami-

Hot Tips for Cooling System


Don't take off the cap if you hear boiling or hissing!

Don't add water while the system is overheated because the water may flash to steam and burn you, and the sudden change of temperature could crack the engine.


Some common causes of overheating are as follows:

1. Leaking head gasket evidenced by oil scum in the radiator.
2. An engine that has been dry for a long time may foul the system with rust.
3. A rebuilt engine that is still too tight.
4. Sometimes radiator fins lose the thermal-conducting bond to the tubes. Replacement is the only fix.
5. Driver management of fuel mixture and spark timing.


The bottom line is: The Model A will not boil if everything is up to specs.

IT MEASURES YOUR MILES

A speedometer is a device used on motor vehicles to indicate mileage. Most speedometers have attachments which indicate the total number of miles travelled, miles per hour and mileage per trip.

This speedometer, which resembles the "A", is operated through the action of a revolving magnet driven by a flexible shaft driven from a gear coupled to the drive shaft.

Though not required by law, speedometers are almost a necessary part of the equipment of a motor vehicle since all communities have speed laws which must be obeyed. Reprint from Model A News Vol 14 Issue 4




